

GUIDELINES FOR TEACHERS: HOW TO USE THE REALITY TASKS TOOLKIT

The **Reality Tasks Toolkit** is a flexible and interactive teaching tool designed to help students reflect on real-life digital citizenship issues. It contains **30 engaging situational cards** organized into **seven key topics**, covering everything from online safety to ethical communication and digital well-being.

These cards are ideal for sparking discussions, encouraging critical thinking, and supporting civic education. Here's how to make the most of them in your classroom:



Start by selecting one of the seven key topics:

- Basics of Digital Citizenship → When humour crosses the line; The gaming account giveaway; Digital footprint; Cybersecurity.
- The Digital Ecosystem and the Digital
 Citizen → Cat phishing scams; Identity theft or content theft; Copyright and plagiarism;
 Online stranger danger.





- Safe Online Navigation → Privacy and consent online; A suspicious account; The risks of online exposure; Real versus virtual world; Be careful who you trust!
- Ethical Online Communication → Fat shaming (hate speech); Viral fight displayed online; How to deal with trolls online?; Fake advertising.
- Critical Evaluation of Information → Deceptive
 circulation of information: new challenges with AI; Fake
 news going viral online; Making informed decisions based on
 information collected on digital platforms; Propaganda
 circulating on digital platforms; Spotting fake news together.



- The Digital Consumer → Promotion of scam?;
 Ooops! Something's gone wrong...; False digital advertising; Unsafe digital consumption.
- Time Management and Digital Well-being →
 Overwhelmed by digital exposure; The Digital Detox
 challenge; The grip of Digital Addiction; The Screen
 time struggle.



Each topic contains **4–5 real-life scenarios** that are relevant and designed to provoke reflection and discussion.

2. SELECT ONE OR MORE SITUATIONAL CARDS



Choose one or more situational cards from the selected topic.

Each card presents a **realistic digital dilemma or challenge**.

You can:

- Use a single card to introduce or wrap up a lesson
- Assign cards to small groups for discussion or role-play.

3. ENGAGE STUDENTS IN REFLECTION AND DISCUSSION

Ask students to read and role-play the scenario and reflect on the specific situation examined, using the provided guiding questions.

Encourage respectful debate, empathy, and multiple viewpoints.



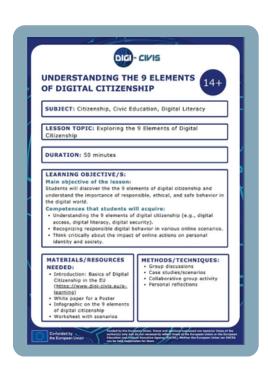

1. BASICS OF DIGITAL CITIZENSHIP

1. WHEN HUMOUR CROSSES THE LINE



SITUATION

Max and his friends participate in a **group chat** where they often share funny videos and memes. One day, Max receives a video from a friend showing a **prank** in which an **unsuspecting person gets very hurt**. The video was edited to look funny and quickly spread through their chatroom, however, the images are explicit and violent. **Max laughs at first, but then feels uncomfortable sharing it with the group**.

His friend Mia, who is part of the chatroom, sees the video and expresses her discomfort, **stating that the content is inappropriate**, should not be spread and could be seen as **bullying**. The group discusses whether sharing such content is acceptable for fun or whether it crosses the line.

QUESTIONS FOR MAX

- Did you think about how it might affect the person being pranked?
- How do you feel now that Mia has pointed out her discomfort with the video? Has your perspective changed?
- What factors do you think make a video funny or appropriate to share? Are there limits?

QUESTIONS FOR MIA

- What specifically made you uncomfortable about the video? Can you explain your feelings to the group?
- How do you think sharing this kind of content can affect the people involved and the audience watching?
- Why do you believe it's important to speak up against content that seems inappropriate, even if others find it funny?
- If Max and the others decide to ignore your concerns, what actions could you take to stand by your values?

- If you were in Max's position, would you share the video with the group? Why or why not?
- If you were Mia, how would you handle friends who might dismiss your feelings about the video?
- Have you ever found yourself in a situation where you felt uncomfortable about something shared online? How did you respond?



2. THE GAMING ACCOUNT GIVEAWAY



SITUATION

Jaden, Lily, and Mark are part of a popular online gaming community. One day, Jaden excitedly tells his friends about a new in-game item giveaway organized by an influencer he follows.

The giveaway requires participants to **share their gaming account login details to** "**verify**" **their participation**. Jaden is eager to participate and is ready to share his login credentials for a chance to win rare items.

Lily quickly warns Jaden that sharing login details is dangerous and **could cause him to lose his account**. Mark, on the other hand, thinks **it is harmless because the influencer seems trustworthy and has a large following**. Jaden is torn between his desire to enter the contest, and the risks Lily pointed out.

QUESTIONS FOR JADEN

- Why were you excited to share your gaming account information for the giveaway? Did you have any concerns initially?
- What might happen if you share your account details, and how would you handle it if your account was compromised?
- Will you still enter the giveaway after hearing both Lily's and Mark's opinions? Why or why not?

QUESTIONS FOR LILY

- Why were you immediately concerned when Jaden mentioned sharing his login information?
- What would you say to Mark, who thinks that the giveaway is safe because the influencer seems reputable?
- How do you make sure that your own personal information is protected when participating in online games or communities?
- What advice would you give Jaden if he really wanted to enter, but you knew it wasn't safe?

QUESTIONS FOR MARK

- What made you trust the giveaway just because the influencer has a large following?
- Why do you think it's important to verify the legitimacy of a contest or giveaway before participating?
- Do you believe Lily's concerns are valid, or do you think she's overreacting? Why?
- What would you do if you entered the giveaway and something went wrong with your gaming account?



3. DIGITAL FOOTPRINT



SITUATION

Jamie, a 16-year-old student, discovers that personal information and embarrassing photos from a few years ago have resurfaced on social media and are being shared widely. Jamie is distressed because this could potentially impact future college applications and personal reputation. Jamie's friend, Taylor, is very supportive and helps Jamie contact social media platforms to report the content. They decide to discuss their concerns with their classmate, Julia, to understand the implications of their digital footprints and how to address the issues that have arisen.

QUESTIONS FOR JAMIE

- How did you react when you first discovered that your personal information and photos were being shared online?
- How did you discover that your personal information and photos had resurfaced online?
- What immediate concerns do you have about how this might affect your future?
- How did Taylor's actions help you address the situation?

QUESTIONS FOR TAYLOR

- What was your initial reaction when Jamie told you about the resurfaced personal information?
- What do you think you can do to support Jamie during this situation?
- How do you plan to help Jamie understand and manage their digital footprint moving forward?

QUESTIONS FOR JULIA

- How can Jamie work to remove or manage the content that has resurfaced?
- What advice can you give Jamie on managing their digital footprint to prevent similar issues in the future?



4. CYBERSECURITY



SITUATION

Lily, a 17-year-old student, notices that her social media account has been hacked and strange messages are being sent to her friends and family from her account. She feels anxious and unsure of how to regain control over her account. Her classmate, Daniel, who is tech-savvy, offers to help her secure her account and prevent future issues. Meanwhile, another friend, Emily, is unsure about what to do and feels vulnerable, worried that her account could be the next target. Together, they must figure out how to deal with the situation and prevent future cybersecurity risks.

QUESTIONS FOR LILY

- How did you realize that your social media account had been hacked?
- What concerns do you have about the messages being sent from your account?
- What steps have you taken so far to regain control of your account?

QUESTIONS FOR DANIEL

- What advice did you offer to Lily to help her recover her account and secure it?
- How can Lily protect her account from being hacked again in the future?
- What measures can other students, like Emily, take to protect themselves from similar cybersecurity threats?

QUESTIONS FOR EMILY

- How do you feel about your own online safety after seeing what happened to Lily's account?
- What steps do you think you need to take to secure your accounts and avoid being hacked?
- How has this situation made you more aware of the importance of cybersecurity?



2. THE DIGITAL ECOSYSTEM AND THE DIGITAL CITIZEN

5. CAT PHISHING SCAMS



SITUATION

One day, Sophie gets a message from someone named "Jenna", who claims to be a fan of the same game Sophie plays. The two start chatting about their favorite characters. "Jenna" asks Sophie to click on a link to check out a cool video about the game.

Meanwhile, Liam gets a friend request from someone called "Alex", who has a similar profile picture to one of his classmates. "Alex" asks Liam for his email, saying they'll send over some cheat codes for a game they both play.

QUESTIONS FOR SOPHIE

- Did you check if "Jenna's" profile looks real? What signs might help you identify if she's a catfish?
- What could happen if you click on the link "Jenna" sent you? Could it be a phishing attempt?
- How could you verify whether "Jenna" is really who she claims to be?

QUESTIONS FOR LIAM

- Did you notice anything strange about "Alex's" profile? How can you tell if it's someone pretending to be your classmate?
- What could "Alex" do with your email if they were a scammer?
- How should you handle requests for personal information from someone you just met online?

- How can you spot a catfishing or phishing scam?
- What are some red flags?
- Why is it important not to share personal information or click on suspicious links, even if the person seems friendly?



6. IDENTITY THEFT - OR CONTENT THEFT



SITUATION

Mia discovered that someone had created a fake social media profile using her pictures and personal information. The impersonator started messaging her friends and sharing inappropriate content. Distressed, Mia turned to Jake for advice.

QUESTIONS FOR MIA

- How did you feel when you found out about the identity theft?
- What steps did you take once you realized what was happening?
- Did you talk to anyone else about this situation? If so, who?

QUESTIONS FOR JAKE

- What advice did you give Mia to help her deal with the situation?
- How can students better protect themselves from identity theft online?
- What are some signs that someone might be a victim of identity theft?

QUESTIONS FOR EVERYONE

- Why is it important to keep personal information private on social media?
- What actions can schools take to educate students about online safety and identity?

7. COPYRIGHT AND PLAGIARISM



SITUATION

Johanna recently submitted a story for a school competition. She worked many hours researching scientific materials and reading articles, blogs and newspapers on the subject. A few days later, she discovered that Luke had created a graphic that closely resembled her story's plot and shared it online without crediting her. Johanna feels frustrated and confused about what to do next.

QUESTIONS FOR JOHANNA

- I put a lot of effort into my story. How can I protect my creative work from being copied by others?
- What should I do if I find out that someone has copied my work? What steps can I take?



• Is it important to give credit to others when I use their ideas or elements in my own writing? Why or why not?

QUESTIONS FOR LUKE

- I thought it was okay to use ideas from others as inspiration. Is there a line I should be aware of when creating my designs?
- How can I ensure that I'm not accidentally plagiarizing someone else's work when I create something new?
- What resources are available for understanding copyright laws and how they apply to my artwork?

8. ONLINE STRANGER DANGER



SITUATION

Alex and Frida have been communicating online for several weeks by Instagram, sharing common interests and forming a bond of friendship. Frida likes Alex' photos, suggesting some filters and discovering some humor reels. After this time, Frida has suggested meeting in person at a local park. Alex is excited about the prospect but also experiences a sense of apprehension.

QUESTIONS FOR ALEX

- Should I agree to meet Frida in person, considering our limited face-to-face interactions?
- What actions should I take if I feel uncomfortable or unsafe during an in-person meeting with an online acquaintance?

OUESTIONS FOR FRIDA

- Why is it crucial to exercise caution when meeting someone you primarily know through online platforms?
- How important is it that there are friends, people you know who can help you in these moments?



3. SAFE ONLINE NAVIGATION

9. PRIVACY AND CONSENT ONLINE



SITUATION

Emma and her group of friends had a lively online group chat where they shared jokes, made plans for outings, and gave updates about their lives. **Recently, Alex, one of Emma's friends, started dating John, a classmate**. One day, Alex posted a photo to the group chat with the message, "Check this out, guys!". Emma could tell from a quick look at the photo that it was **John in his underwear in a private moment**. She immediately felt uneasy; wandering if John was even aware this picture is being shared.

QUESTIONS FOR EMMA

- Why has Emma felt uneasy about the shared picture?
- What actions Emma could decide to make after seeing the picture?
- What kind of dilemma Emma might be facing in this situation?

QUESTIONS FOR JOHN

- How could John feel when he finds out that Alex shared the picture online?
- What actions could John take if he felt upset about the picture?

QUESTIONS FOR ALEX

- What was Alex thinking when they decided to share the picture of John?
- If Emma comes to Alex to express her uneasiness with the picture of John, how could Alex react?
- If John comes to Alex upset about the picture how could be Alex's reactions?
- What could Alex do to address the harm he might have cause?

- What actions can we take if we see something that is shared in online group chats that makes us uncomfortable?
- How can we create a safe and respectful online environment for everyone in online group chats?
- How can we better protect each other's privacy moving forward?



10. A SUSPICIOUS ACCOUNT



SITUATION

Max and Sam have been good friends for years. One day, Max finds a new social media account with Sam's picture and name, but notices it looks suspicious – few followers and strange posts that don't match Sam's usual style. After following the account, Max sees embarrassing edits of Sam's photos with hurtful comments from classmates. Max suspects the account is fake and meant to bully Sam.

QUESTIONS FOR MAX

- How would you imagine Max approaching Sam about this situation?
- What actions can Max take to verify whether the account is real or fake?

QUESTIONS FOR SAM

- What should Sam do if the account turns out to be fake to protect his identity?
- What are the potential consequences of ignoring or engaging with the fake account?

11. THE RISKS OF ONLINE EXPOSURE



SITUATION

14-year-old Maria is passionate about make-up and experimenting with different looks. For her, Instagram is a platform where she can happily share her creations and connect with others who share the same passion. It's a place where she feels free to express her creativity and build a positive online community. **Anna, a classmate, discovers her account and makes mean comments about her online exposure.** At break time at school, she provokes arguments among classmates about her posts. **Maria faces the fundamental question: who is she really online?** However, instead of being defeated by the negative comments, Maria makes an important decision. She realizes that her personality and her passion for make-up are aspects of her identity, and these should not be swayed or changed by malicious critics.

Maria decides to maintain her authenticity and continue to express her passion, even if it means being vulnerable to online criticism. By continuing to share her passion for make-up and her creativity with the world, Maria rediscovers her self-confidence and asserts her authenticity online. Her identity is not defined by the opinion of others, but by what she truly feels and believes.



QUESTIONS FOR MARIA

- What made Maria pursue her passion for make-up and expose it online?
- · What could Maria say to Anna if she had decided to confront her?
- What steps can Maria take to ensure her Instagram remains a positive space for her and her followers?

QUESTIONS FOR ANNA

- What prompted Anna to discuss Maria's social media images with colleagues?
- Does Anna think about how Maria might feel when she reads her comments or hear her arguments with classmates about her posts?
- If Anna had the chance to apologize to Maria, what would she say?

QUESTIONS FOR EVERYONE

- How do you think Maria's online identity has been affected by this incident?
- How can you support a friend or colleague facing criticism or negative comments online?
- How can you help create a positive and supportive atmosphere in your online community?
- Should individuals adjust their online behavior in order to avoid criticism, or should they remain true to themselves? Why?

12. REAL VERSUS VIRTUAL WORLD



SITUATION

Theo, aged 16, is an energetic and inquisitive kid, passionate about computers, travelling outdoors by bike with friends. One day, while playing online, he **discovers a new app he wants to explore**. Through the game, he can choose a nickname or avatar to represent himself in this virtual world, which gives him the opportunity to express his creativity and individuality. As he progresses through the game and meets other online players, Theo also develops his social and digital communication skills. He becomes increasingly absorbed in his avatar and virtual achievements, forgetting the things that made him happy before.

His parents notice this change and realize they must intervene. So do his friends, who were worried about him not getting out as he used to. **They all encourage him to remember that he is much more than just an avatar in a virtual world**. Eventually, Theo learns that his identity cannot be defined by material things or success in a virtual world. His true identity lies in the relationships he has with those around him and the experiences he has in the real world.



QUESTIONS FOR THEO

- How do you think Theo felt playing the video game?
- How do you think he feels about choosing and customizing his character in the game?
- Do you think Theo's identity in the game might be different or similar to his identity in real life?

QUESTIONS FOR THE PARENTS

- How did the parents realize that Theo had changed?
- What behavior did they observe in Theo?
- What methods should parents use to make Theo more communicative in real life?

QUESTIONS FOR EVERYONE

- What could Theo do in order to spend less time playing?
- What should his friends do for him?
- What would you do if you were in his shoes?
- Why do you think some people need different avatars/identities online?

13. BE CAREFUL WHO YOU TRUST!



SITUATION

Fourteen-year-old Anna falls in love with a schoolmate a year younger than her, Peter. She sends him frequent messages to get his attention, culminating in intimate selfies. Peter posts the pictures on his social networking groups, and Anna receives various messages from schoolmates taunting and harassing her. She becomes increasingly despondent, withdrawn and isolated. Her parents, busy people, noticed their daughter's physical and emotional state and, with a little care and patience, discovered the story the girl was living. They decided to talk to the school management and limit the effects of the situation. They were received by the school management and given assurances that the situation would be sorted out.

After a while, as Anna was still receiving a lot of messages from bullying classmates, her parents decided to move their child to a different school. Anna breathed a sigh of relief, started making friends in the new environment and her school situation improved. Then, one day, the messages started again, just as mean-spirited as in the past, innuendos, jokes, then increasingly harsh comments.



QUESTIONS FOR ANNA

- What might happen if Anna does not seek for help?
- How could Ana's situation be resolved if classmates and adults intervene?
- How should Anna behave so that these messages do not significantly/extremely affect her life?

QUESTIONS FOR PETER

- How should Peter behave when he finds that the girl is persistent in texting? Approach her directly? Write her a private message? Ask for adult support?
- How would Peter feel if images of him, similar to Anna's, were circulating in school groups?
- What are some of the potential consequences for Peter if his actions are reported?

QUESTIONS FOR THE SCHOOL

- How can the school, as an educational institution, support Anna to manage this situation?
- What concrete steps should the school management take to stop the attack on Anna?
- What can schools, parents or peers do to prevent such situations from escalating?

QUESTIONS FOR THE PARENTS

- Who can Anna get support from in this situation?
- What kind of support can Anna get from the people around her (friends, parents, school, etc.)?
- How can they support Anna to understand and manage the situation, at home and at school, in the short and medium/long term?

4. ETHICAL ONLINE COMMUNICATION

14. FAT SHAMING (HATE SPEECH)



SITUATION

Lea, a 13-year-old student, enjoys swimming and is part of the school's swim team. Lea is self-conscious about her body and often feels nervous about wearing a swimsuit in front of others. One day, Lea sees that her classmate, Chris, has created a meme on social media. The meme shows a picture of a person in a swimsuit with the caption, "Maybe if they spent less time eating and more time swimming, they'd win some races." Other classmates liked and commented on the meme; saying things like: "I did not know whales could wear swimsuits". Lea immediately feels hurt and self-conscious.



Lea feels particularly hurt. The post created gets more and more views, likes and hurtful comments by other classmates. Chris is an intimidating person who sits at the popular table. He is praised for the post that is considered funny. This is why **she decides to not talk about it with anyone**.

QUESTIONS FOR LEA

- · How do you feel in this situation?
- What kind of thoughts could you be having?
- What do you think you will do if you feel very upset about the situation?

QUESTIONS FOR CHRIS

- What about you Chris?
- What might have crossed your mind when you took the initiative to create such a post?

The gym teacher, **Mr. William**, notices that Lea is not coming to swimming practice anymore. He asks her what is wrong. Conflicted by the issue, Lea decides to tell him about the situation and the post created by Chris. Lea obviously **needs advice** on how to handle her feelings and deal with such a situation.

QUESTIONS FOR MR. WILLIAM

- As Mr. William, what kind of advice would you give Lea?
- What kind of attitude should you, as Mr. William, avoid using with Lea?
- How can you approach this sensitive issue in class?
- What key points should you include in your discussion?

When Mr. William addressed the topic of shaming people online in class, Lea realises there are many students on the swim team who **struggle with body image issues**, like her. Thus, she decides to confront Chris about it.

QUESTIONS FOR LEA

- As Lea what would you say to Chris?
- How would you express your feelings?

QUESTIONS FOR CHRIS

- What kinds of different reactions you might have to Lea's concern?
- What could you do to make amends with what you did to Lea?



15. VIRAL FIGHT DISPLAYED ONLINE



SITUATION

During lunch break, **Ethan and Marcus** get into a heated argument over a basketball game that happened earlier that day. Their verbal argument quickly escalates into a **physical fight** in the school cafeteria.

Several students gather around to watch, and among them is **Clara**, who starts **recording the fight** on her phone.

Clara shares the video on her social media, and within minutes, it goes viral among the students.

QUESTIONS FOR ETHAN

- How did you feel knowing that your fight with Marcus was recorded and shared online?
- What impact did seeing the video and reading the comments have on you?
- How might the presence of cameras and the possibility of being recorded influence your behavior in future conflicts?

QUESTIONS FOR CLARA

- Why did you decide to record and share the fight online?
- How did you feel about the video going viral, and what reactions did you observe online?
- What considerations do you think you should take into account before recording and sharing similar incidents in the future?

QUESTIONS FOR MARCUS

- What were your thoughts when you found out the fight was posted online?
- How did the online reaction to the video affect you emotionally?
- In what ways do you think social media can escalate or de-escalate conflicts like this?

QUESTIONS FOR STUDENTS WATCHING

- How did you feel about Clara recording and sharing the fight on social media?
- What role do you think social media played in the aftermath of the fight?
- How do you think you and your peers should respond to witnessing a fight in the future, both in person and online?



16. HOW TO DEAL WITH TROLLS ONLINE?



SITUATION

Milo recently shared a post on a popular forum about a personal project they're passionate about – a series of digital illustrations they created to raise awareness about environmental issues. While many people appreciated their work, a group of trolls started leaving negative and mocking comments, criticizing the art and questioning their knowledge on the topic. The comments ranged from outright insults to sarcastic and dismissive remarks that encouraged others to join in on the negativity. As more trolls jumped onto the thread, the comments became increasingly toxic, and the conversation quickly derailed from the original purpose of the post. Milo felt overwhelmed and upset by the flood of negativity, unsure whether to respond, delete the post, or seek help.

Meanwhile, **Jordan**, another member of the forum who follows Milo's work, **notices the trolling**. Jordan values respectful online interactions and is deciding how best to step in.

QUESTIONS FOR MILO

- How should Milo respond to the trolls without escalating the situation?
- What steps can Milo take to manage or report the trolling behaviour on the platform?
- How can Milo seek support from friends, other users, or moderators to handle the trolls?

OUESTIONS FOR JORDAN

- How can Jordan support Milo in this situation, and what actions can they take as a third party?
- Should Jordan publicly defend Milo, report the trolls, or privately message Milo to offer support?

- How can Milo and Jordan work together to address the trolling while maintaining a focus on positive communication and mental well-being?
- What impact might engaging with the trolls have, and what are the potential benefits of ignoring or blocking them?



17. FAKE ADVERTISING



SITUATION

Liam comes across a social media post from an account claiming to offer a "limited-time giveaway" of the latest smartphone. The post says all winners need to do is provide their personal information, including a phone number and email address, and pay a small "processing fee" using a payment card. The account encourages entrants to join a private group chat for updates and to improve their chances of winning by meeting the organizer in person.

The account looks suspicious – its profile is newly created, the brand logo seems slightly different, and there are no verified marks. Liam feels tempted by the promise of a new phone but is uneasy about sharing payment information and meeting a stranger in person.

QUESTIONS FOR LIAM

- How can Liam identify signs that the giveaway might be a scam before sharing personal or payment details?
- What risks are involved in sharing a parent's payment card information or meeting a stranger from the internet?
- What should Liam do if they suspect the giveaway is a scam?
- How can Liam report this suspicious activity to the platform?
- How can Liam protect themselves from falling for similar scams in the future?

5. CRITICAL EVALUATION OF INFORMATION

18. DECEPTIVE CIRCULATION OF INFORMATION: NEW CHALLENGES WITH AI



SITUATION

Sarah, a 17-year-old student, is researching online for a school project and comes across a video online that appears to show a politician making offensive statements. The video is spreading quickly on social media, and Sarah feels upset by what she saw. However, her friend **Max suspects that the video might be a "deepfake", an AI-generated video designed to deceive viewers**. Max explains that **AI tools can create highly realistic yet fake videos**, and they need to verify the content before believing or sharing it. Now Sarah feels confused about what's real and what's not and is unsure about how to approach the situation.



QUESTIONS FOR SARAH

- How did the video you watched make you feel, and why did you believe it at first?

- What steps could be necessary to determine if the promotion is genuine or a scam?

QUESTIONS FOR JAKE

- Why don't we call directly Samsung Customer's Service to check?
- What if the prom doesn't really come from them?

- What would you do if you saw such an offer?
- What would your first reaction be?
- · Have you heard of such fake proms before?



24. OOOPS! SOMETHING'S GONE WRONG...



SITUATION

Mike is telling his friend **Rob** that he has just received a damaged item he had bought secondhand and he is **not sure if he has legal rights to a refund or a replacement**. Mike feels disappointed because he had been waiting for the item for so long and he now wants to know if he could replace it with a new one. Mike and Rob decide to visit the seller's website in search for an answer.

QUESTIONS FOR MIKE

- Have you ever received a damaged item?
- What can I do?
- Have I got the right to ask for a refund or a replacement, even if the item is secondhand?
- What signs could indicate a trustworthy seller when buying secondhand goods?
- How can Mike protect himself in future online purchases (e.g., reviews, secure payment methods)?

Look what I have found:

If the goods are faulty you are entitled to claim a repair or replacement of the goods from the retailer. Alternatively, if you have not used the goods, and they were faulty when delivered, you may be entitled to a full refund.

If you have used the goods for more than six months, then, before a repair or replacement is offered, you may be asked to prove that the goods were faulty when delivered. In some cases, repair or replacement is not possible, or would be disproportionately costly given the value of the goods and the nature of the fault. In these instances, you may be entitled to either keep the goods and claim a reduction in price from the retailer or to return the goods and obtain a partial refund. In determining the price reduction or the level of the refund, the retailer may take into account the use you have had of the goods since they were delivered to you. If you have used the goods for more than six months, then before a reduction in price or partial refund is offered, you may be asked to prove that the goods were faulty when delivered.
